PASTOR'S CORNER

Do you remember the hit song by ABBA: Money, Money, Money?

*"Money, money, money...Must be funny in the rich man's world
Money, money, money...Always sunny in the rich man's world...Aha...
All the things I could do if I had a little money...It's a rich man's world...
It's a rich man's world."*

A few years ago, a massive survey was conducted, and the results were published in the book, *The Day America Told the Truth*. It is a book about the U.S, but I do not think it is much of a stretch to include Canada in these statistics. In the survey, they asked this one question: What would you be willing to do for ten million dollars? Here are the answers:

The mood in the room became serious and somber very quickly, because they were discovering their true treasures. Some of the participants were surprised, others were shocked and only few of them were truly at peace with their choices in life.

Trying to be honest with yourself can be a sobering but ultimately life-changing exercise, particularly in our materialistic society where "treasures in heaven" often seem to be "pie in the sky, bye and bye," for someone sarcastically said, *"Money may not buy happiness, but I'd rather cry in a BMW than on a bus."* But as Christians, instead of this cynical remark, we should always remember this quote: *"God wants lovers of eternity, not slaves of this fleeting moment."*

So perhaps it is true that to have more, we need to desire less.

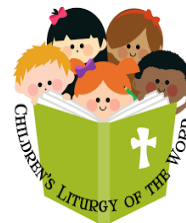
