PASTOR'S CORNER

Why do you work, or why did you used to work? We usually take this question for granted. In a sense, the answer is very simple: Jobs are what people do for a living, many of them for eight hours a day, five days a week, minus vacations, for most of their lives. Basically, we work mainly for the purpose of making money enough to enjoy our moments of not working. It is estimated we spend about 80,000 hours of our life at work. Moreover, we forget what a gift this is until our job is taken away from us.

In the Old Testament we read this phrase: "What do people gain from all the toil at which they toil under the sun?" (Ecclesiastes 1:3). If people are in it only for the money, the money is all they gain, and when they finally retire, they may well ask themselves if it was worth giving most of their lives for. But if they are doing it for its own sake and they truly enjoy doing it, they will discover that it is the most sublime wisdom of life, which is meant to be very practical at the same time. So whatever you do in life, try to do it with a more appreciative mindset. What I mean is that you ought to remember to explore the real purpose of your daily toil – not just where and how, but also why. Why did God put you where you are now? Let me offer you a metaphorical answer by a way of Peanuts cartoon:

Lucy and Linus are sitting in front of the television set. Lucy says to Linus, "Go and get me a glass of water."

Linus looks surprised. "Why should I do anything for you? You never do anything for me."

"On your 75th birthday," Lucy promises, "I'll bake you a cake."

So Linus gets up, heads into the kitchen and says, "Life is more pleasant when you have something to look forward to."
